Simon Tennant, Parish Council Chairman writes:

Addingham Commemoration of the 80th Anniversary of D-Day Thursday 6th June 2024



I wanted to share details of the plans that the Parish

Council and community groups have made to mark the occasion.

On the 6th June

- **The WI will serve tea and cake** from a gazebo outside the library, coinciding with the exhibition opening hours in the afternoon.
- **Shops and businesses and homeowners** dress their windows and create themed displays.
- Any residents who enjoying dressing in 1940's style, are warmly invited to join in.
- **6.30 pm** a short moment of quiet reflection to be held at the war memorial, led by the Churches. Pupils from Addingham Primary School will also participate in the short service.
- 7.00 pm Addingham Singers to perform on The Swan Deck.
- **The Heritage Group** will create a slide show alongside a display featuring four men from Addingham who served in the conflict. The displays will be in the Hub throughout June.
- Addingham Primary School will create a display of Yr6 work for the Hub.

Cllr Peter Hindle has been kind enough to share his memories of life in June 1944 and I am pleased to include them here.

"As a war baby born early 1941 I have a few memories such as my Mother telling me to go next door and say goodbye to Jimmy Hampshire because he has to go away and didn't know when he would be home again. Jimmy was a soldier aged about 20 packing his kit. He tapped me on the head with a bunch of rolled up socks. I never saw him again. He was killed a few days after the landings." "My Father joined up as a regular soldier and got to be a sergeant in REME. He was a complete stranger to me as I only saw him when he had some leave. I remember when on army leave our larder was full of hanging pheasants, rabbits and hares. He must have been the scourge of the local gamekeepers."

"After Carol and I married we became good friends of Ken and Brenda Crooks. Brenda's Dad was Les Chamberlain and in the Airborne. His DDAY started the day before the big push. His lot were sent to capture the Pegasus Bridge. They were in gliders which landed on a patch of land between the river and the canal. Les told me that when about to land someone would shout Asparagus! They would all get their feet as high up from the floor as possible. (The Germans had a habit of fixing metal poles in the ground to damage anything landing). Les told me that when they had taken the bridge the next thing was to capture the little

French house over the bridge. They sent Les to do this as he knew the "lingo". He said the family were hiding in the cellar and came out when they realised they were British. Les became a lifelong friend of the family.

Carol and I, as guests of Ken and Brenda, went with them a couple of times to 6th June Reunion. The reason Les knew the "lingo" was that he was captured by the Germans and was being marched across country he, and another squaddie, made off and ended up on a French farm for quite some time as a "French worker". This is where he picked up the "lingo"!

(Has anyone seen "Alo Alo?)"

"When we moved to Addingham I became pals with George Kettlewell. He lived a few doors up. Being a retired builder like myself, I would go up to his house Thursday evenings and swap building tales about people we knew and jobs we had done, have a couple of drams and watch football. George was a Royal Navy signalman.

He was on landing craft for Dday. Their boat left Portsmouth with 300 men and 3 or 4 tanks or lorries. I forget which he said. They landed them on the beach then kept going back to the ships for the troops to deliver them onto the beach. As they were working 24 hour days they had 2 crews for landing crafts. Unfortunately George's opposite number was killed on his shift.

I told George that Carol and I had visited all these beaches and asked if he had ever been back. He said he would never go back because every time they landed more men there were more and more dead lads floating in the surf and try as they would they couldn't avoid all of them."

George lived to his 90th year.

"I remember my Mother and Mrs H next door having a chat over the garden wall. They must have had some secret information from the home office as the conversation was "They are going to drop the bomb tonight.", "Yes I understand, so 7pm our time". I was messing about in our yard and heard all this. It was something we all talked about in those days the A.Bomb and Japan. From my attic window in Tivoli Place I could see over, what I now know as Denton Moor. In those days I thought Japan was over the hill so I made sure I was outside that night to hear the Bang!!!"

Addingham Heritage Group

Ian Cameron, Chair, writes: The village has a wonderfully varied history, of interest to residents and visitors, but are we communicating this well enough? The interpretation board at High Mill, launched last year, has been a great success, centred around the atmospheric painting by JW Turner. But what of Low Mill? Built in 1787, it successfully produced the world's first machine spun worsted yarn. Then in 1826, the mill was attacked by the Yorkshire Weaver rioters and later made a contribution to the World War Two effort by making carburettors for Spitfires, and silk for parachutes. We do have the blue plaque about Penny Hole at Low Mill, but we could provide more historical information to those thousands passing along the Dalesway. This would also be in line with the wish of the organisers of Bradford City of Culture 2025 to have a network of heritage walks across Bradford – and we are already well placed to help with this.

Our intention is to have a historical information board, similar to that at High Mill, at the entrance of Low Mill village by the weir. We have the owner's consent and support from the Parish Council. We would like to have the board in place in the summer.



Addingham Allotment and Gardens Association

It doesn't seem two minutes since we assembled in the Memorial Hall in March last year for our first AGM since 2019. At that time a small group had formed a steering committee and re-established the Association in what was the 50th anniversary year.



We updated the website and created an household membership fee inclusive of a range of benefits at an annual cost of £12. We now have 80 members and we held nine events in our first year. including our very own version of GQT, the staging of the Annual Show for the first time in four years and our first ever Pumpkin Fest in October in conjunction with the village primary school. To round off the year we joined with the Civic Society for a talk on the 12 plants of Christmas, made all the more pleasurable thanks to

mince pies and mulled wine (!), and it was great to see the Memorial Hall packed yet again.

Our plans for 2024 are already in place. Our AGM was held in

January at the Methodist Church Hall and we were delighted with the attendance on a very wet and windy evening. A motion to insert a statement of intent into our constitution to commit our Association to working towards a sustainable future, and in particular exploring ways of reducing our carbon footprint, minimising waste and promoting composting, managing the use of water wisely and protecting and encouraging nature and wildlife



was carried unanimously. **The Annual Show will take place on the 10th August** and we're pleased to be able to bring back the Spring Show which be held on the 20th April – daffodils, tulips, et al!

One final point; we want our Association to be inclusive right across the gardening spectrum. So whether you have an allotment, a garden, a few plant pots or a couple of window boxes, or maybe none of those but just a passion for gardening then do please consider joining us:

Climate Action Addingham

We are gathering momentum!

November saw a full house for our "How Green is our Village? One Year On". We are building a partnership of like-minded community groups in the village and have agreed a list of sustainability objectives, initiated a series of village environmental projects, conducted a village questionnaire on climate change and agreed a programme for 2024.



The Climate Change Questionnaire

Following the formation of CAA in 2022 we wanted to know more about residents' interest in climate change. We created a questionnaire modelled it on one designed by central government for use nationally, so we could compare our village responses to the national average.

Using the Bradford Council Property Register **200 households were randomly selected.**

Of these, we had 134 positive responses to take part with 108 forms returned by the deadline. A great response. Thankyou to our 20 volunteers who visited these homes!







for our survey results

Here is a brief summary of the results:

When asked "How concerned,

if at all, are you about climate change, sometimes referred to as global warming", 93% replied they were very concerned/ concerned.

When asked what steps respondents were taking to combat climate change, from the list offered:

- Over 98% of households said they were recycling household waste
- Over 90% are attempting to minimise energy consumption
- Over 65% consider energy efficiency when buying electrical appliances
- Over 65% minimise tap water consumption;
- Less than 43% consider walking and cycling rather than using a car
- Less than 33% consider using public transport rather than using a car
- Now 33% of respondents fly less, and
- Now 5% own an electric car.

On the question about trust in information sources, respondents trusted scientists (91%) and scientific organisations (89%) most. There was little trust in social media (30%), and government (50%) sources.

We asked whether individuals could make a difference. An overwhelming majority of respondents agreed that everyone could contribute to the solutions by making changes to their lifestyles.

Overall these are very positive results indicating that proposals to reduce our carbon footprints individually and as a community are likely to find support amongst the majority of village residents.

Addingham Ceilidh Club

Liz Bowen writes: We currently meet on the third Sunday of the month, in the Memorial Hall, where we dance to the fantastic music provided by our regular band of musicians. Most of the dancers we enjoy at ceilidhs have survived many decades, some even centuries but now also include new dances recently devised.

Wharfedale is particularly rich as a source of the country dances which have been passed on through generations together with tunes and songs. There are many accounts of farming families up the Dale which tell of the dances which were popular. After a hard day's work on a Saturday they would call at the local inn to unwind over a pint or so before arriving at the dance about nine o'clock. The musicians and dancers thought nothing of dancing until 3 or 4 in the morning and then getting straight onto the task of caring for their livestock.

During the second world war when petrol was rationed, one of the musicians, Harry Cockerill, a well known Dalesman and accomplished accordion player, got round the restrictions on petrol by "delivering" a tup to the village hall!

Not all dances from these early times were held in a village hall, many were held in barns or in the larger houses when one of the servants would play on their fiddle or melodeon for everyone to dance to before enjoying a supper provided by the master of the house.

Addingham Methodist Church

Dear Friends,

A difficult decision In the Spring of 2023, our church made a difficult decision. For various reasons we have decided to sell our church building on Chapel Street. There has been a Methodist presence in Addingham for nearly 300 years! As early as 1744 there is evidence of Methodist preaching in Addingham and the local area. John Wesley, himself, preached here in 1766. The first Methodist Meeting House was dedicated in 1788 and over time, the Chapel was built along with the Methodist School which is our current building for worship and ministry. Many of you have fond memories of attending school in our building. Our facilities have offered community space for various groups throughout the centuries. We did not make the decision to sell lightly. Much prayer, deliberation and realistic planning for the future were involved.

Our plans for the future Even though we have decided to sell our present building, our congregation plans to continue to meet for worship, learning and outreach to the community and beyond. In a nutshell, we are not closing! There will still be a Methodist presence in this village, but in a different way that goes beyond an identified building with our name on it.

We believe God is inviting us to be church in a new way and that Methodism itself has something valuable to offer to the people. Becoming more visible by being out in the community is perhaps a perk of not having our own building anymore. You might find we're meeting in the pub, coffee shop, or other local spaces including outdoors, as we seek to connect with God and each other. We want to foster spiritual curiosity, welcoming those who have not joined us before. As the church, we believe that Christ and the way he lived his life bear the most life-giving answers to the questions that keep people awake at night. Much hope can be found in our world that is both good and broken. We invite people to join us on this journey of life and faith.

The Building We do not yet have an exact time frame for the sale of our building. We will continue to be in it until it is sold. The local community groups that meet in our building are welcome to do the same. We covet everyone's prayers and positive thoughts as we take this next faithful step into an unknown future.

In the meantime, we invite you to join us on any given Sunday for worship at 10:30am in our church hall. Twice a quarter, we offer café-style worship which is informal and interactive with refreshments provided before the service.

Together We're also involved in Addingham Churches Together (ACT), and jointly with St. Peter's to provide regular Messy Church sessions for children and families. Here are upcoming meeting dates for that: 25th February, 17th March, 28th April, and 19th May. Please check the website of our church and St. Peter's for future dates and the venue of Messy Church.

During Holy Week, we plan to offer a reflective Good Friday evening service in addition to being involved in the ACT village "Act of Witness" on Friday morning. Easter morning we'll celebrate Christ's resurrection with Holy Communion at 10:30am. Everyone is warmly welcomed.

May the season of Spring bring hope and newness of life to you and those you love.

Wildlife Friendly Addingham - Old Station Way Meadow

Working together, Bradford Council, The Garden Friends, Addingham Environment Group and The Parish Council have transformed this green space from close mown grass to a meadow full of native wildflowers, buzzing with bumblebees and other insect life through the spring, summer, and early autumn as they feed on the pollen and nectar rich plants, and in the process pollinate the flowers. Seed heads and a more diverse range of creatures in the soil provide food for birds and other wildlife through the year.

The meadow year starts in late March, early April as primrose, dandelions and later cowslips, and red campion come into flower. These pollen and nectar rich plants provide an important source of food for Queen bumblebees as they emerge from hibernation and establish their nests.

In May as the grass starts to grow Bradford Council's grass cutting team begin cutting paths through the meadow, for everyone to use and enjoy. The margins are also mown along the edges of the road and pavements, to keep these tidy and to preserve sightlines. The rest of the meadow is left uncut to allow the grasses and wildflowers to flourish.

By late May, early June there is abundant yellow rattle, bird's foot trefoil, ox-eye daisy and red clover coming into flower. Worker bees can be seen collecting the pollen and nectar to provide food for the growing nests.

Sowing yellow rattle has been key to increasing the abundance of wildflowers. This is a northern hay meadow plant which is especially helpful as it is parasitic on the roots of grasses and creates room for other native wildflowers to grow, by suppressing the grass. The 'yellow rattle effect' is clear to see on Old Station Way.

Later in the summer plants such as common and great knapweed, scabious and betony come into flower, providing an important source of food as the bumblebee nests are producing new queens and males. As the summer progresses, and the grasses and flowers grow taller, the grass cutting team cut a wider margin at the top of the meadow to preserve sightlines and continue to cut the grass paths. The rest of the meadow is left so that wildflowers can continue to flower and set seed. At this time of year it can start to look a little untidy, but it is a crucial part of the annual life-cycle.

In September, the whole meadow is mown and the grass taken off for composting by the Bradford Council team. Wildflowers thrive best in low nutrient conditions, so by taking off this 'crop' we are replicating traditional Dales hay meadow management. Over the winter the meadow largely looks after itself.

Monitoring Progress Addingham Environment Group members keep an eye on the meadow and monitor progress. A survey of the wildflowers growing here in 2022, found 27 species of flowering plant, compared to 13 in 2016, and a greater variety of native grasses too. One of our bee and butterfly observers visits the meadow as part of a monthly transect. Five species of bumble bee have been recorded and are seen on the red clover, bird's foot trefoil, common knapweed and yellow rattle which is now abundant. Meadow brown, ringlet, large and small white butterflies are also seen here.

There are side benefits to this management regime here and at other sites in the village. Mowing less often reduces carbon emissions, the diversity of plants in a species-rich meadow creates a better soil structure, helps to slow rainwater runoff and stores more carbon than close-mown grass.

As part of Climate Action Addingham, the Environment Group is working with landowners around the village to manage our green spaces in a more sustainable, wildlife friendly way. Read more on our website: https://www. addinghamenvironmentgroup.org.uk/environmentnew/index.php/wildlife/wildflowers

Addingham Garden Friends

Our Story by Don Barrett

The Friends was set up in 2001 as an independent group of volunteers to help look after the village gardens, to replace the previous Village in Bloom group which was a Parish Council off-shoot. Initially there were about 16 of us and we have never since had less than that - we currently have 24 members, which is great.

We are fortunate in Addingham to have seven garden areas along Main Street, including Sugar Hill and the area around the Mem Hall and Medical Centre, and one in North Street. In several cases the gardens are on the site of cottages which were demolished as unfit for human habitation in the 1960s and one disadvantage of gardening on former demolition sites is that the soil is often very shallow before hitting rubble or, in some cases, the Town Beck culverts which run close to the surface. The site of the Hen Pen Garden has, surprisingly, never been built on (see the Spring 2022 newsletter). We also have 22 planters and containers so there is plenty of work to keep us busy.

Many of you will remember that we used to enter the annual Yorkshire in Bloom competition and had great success, winning many top awards and finally reaching the final of Britain in Bloom against all the similar sized communities throughout the country. This proved that little Addingham had talent but the competition became a considerable distraction and expense so we decided to rest on our, not inconsiderable, laurels.

Of, course, new plants and materials cost money and we've recently started replacing the large planters round the village with ones made of recycled plastic – environmentally friendly but expensive! However, we get an annual grant from the Parish Council and have been generously supported by the Civic Society, the Sir George Martin Trust and the Beer Festival among many others. We have a good relationship with Bradford Council's Parks & Landscape Dept which used to provide bedding plants and help in other ways but successive Council cut-backs limit what they can now do. However, they help when they can. We now concentrate on permanent plants, be they shrubs or perennials, which work out cheaper in the long run and are less wasteful than bedding plants.

Our members are mainly retirees, with varying horticultural expertise, but we work in small teams, each one covering a garden or area, so there's always someone to ask. We have monthly planning meetings to discuss what we've done and what needs doing but it is not all work and no play: we meet up in the Hub for coffee and a chat after gardening sessions, have a New Year party to start the year plus Summer outings to open gardens to see how it should be done!

The social side is important – we are not called 'Friends' for nothing! If you would like to join us, or have some spare plants that you are willing to donate, please contact Rita on 01943 839855.

Dear PC

On behalf of Low Mill residents, I want to I am writing regarding the icy paths this morning in Addingham. Do we still have somebody to distribute rock salt on the main paths? I was interested in finding out who was responsible for ensuring the safety of the paths. It may stop older people, who may already be isolated, from venturing out.

Response:

While Bradford Council are responsible for the safety of people using the highways and footpaths, the Parish Council provided additional grit bins last year at key locations in the village. The grit is there for residents to use for themselves and to help their neighbours. The village lengthsman helps spread grit too.

Dear PC.

What is the story behind the Quacks page?

In 2016, in the aftermath of the floods over the Christmas and New Year holiday period that year, the Parish Council set up a Facebook page, Addingham Quack, to help spread messages around the community as quickly as possible. This was initially for the purpose of helping everyone help each other at times when the community had to respond to disasters and problems, but since then, Addingham Quack has become useful mainly to share news, chat and information.

There are, of course, other ways of doing this, the Council often receives letters and emails from village residents. Some of these bring to light issues which are of general interest, and we thought that the newsletter could be a good way of sharing these more widely. Here we publish a sample of this sort of correspondence, together with a note of the response provided in each case.

Dear PC,

I have spotted Ragwort in the village during July and August. What should I do?

Response:

The Parish Council was made aware at the time and agreed a Ragwort Control procedure for public spaces. The DEFRA Code of Practice (2003) on how to prevent

the spread of Common Ragwort aims to

define the situations where there is a likelihood of Common Ragwort spreading to neighbouring land where it will present an identifiable risk of ingestion by

vulnerable grazing animals.

Under the Weeds Act 1959 the occupier of land should take action to prevent the spread of Common Ragwort.

Members of the public are asked to report any sightings to the Parish Council and our Lengthsman will remove it. Ragwort is a toxic plant and precautions must be taken when handling live or dead plants.

Parish Council Allotments

Did you know that the Parish Council owns and manages four allotment sites in the village, with over 125 plots?

Allotments have been in existence for hundreds of years, with evidence pointing back to Anglo-Saxon times. But the system we recognise today has its roots in the Nineteenth Century, when land was given over to the poor for the provision of food growing. This measure was desperately needed thanks to the rapid industrialisation of the country and the lack of a welfare state. In 1908 the Small Holdings and Allotments Act came into force, placing a duty on local authorities to provide sufficient allotments, according to demand.



Plot-holders are part of a community of like-minded people, many of whom are eager to share their knowledge, spare produce and seeds. The social contact offered by gardening in an allotment environment is an antidote to loneliness! Many allotment gardeners will tell you that a spell on the plot nurturing plants and contemplating nature is calming and uplifting.

The physical benefits of regular spells of gardening help plot-holders to keep fit even if they have sedentary jobs, the physical exercise also contributes to their mental well-being. produce enough food to supplement a family's weekly shop, with fresh fruit and vegetables over the year.

Working a plot year round means that allotment holders experience the seasons, witness the behaviour of birds, insects and other animals.

Tenants pay a small amount of rent each year to the Parish Council; This is currently £35 for a full plot and £17.50 for a half size plot. Plot holders in Addingham are all village residents.

The Parish Council works alongside the Allotments and Gardens Association (AA&GA), more about which on page 7.

The council has several empty plots looking for a new tenant. We have sites at Stockinger Lane and Silsden Road – easy to get to by car or on foot.
