

Addingham men who died during the Burma Campaign

Laurence Michael Egan

Laurie, as he was known, lived near Mount Hermon Chapel in a house which was later demolished to allow Bolton Road to be widened. Laurie was previously employed by James Adams Ltd in Addingham and he was a popular member of the Athletic Club. Laurie McRink, his uncle, (after whom he had presumably been named) had been killed in WW1. Laurie joined up in May 1941 and was a Gunner in the Royal Artillery. He was sent to India in December 1941 and was posted missing while serving with the Royal Artillery Indian Command. It was later confirmed that he had been killed instantly on 17 March 1944, aged only 22.

Laurence Egan is memorialised on Memorial Face 2 in the Rangoon Memorial in Burma which contains the names of 27,000 Commonwealth soldiers who died in Burma with no known grave.

Ernest Turnpenny

Ernest was born on 18 December 1913, the eldest son of William and Lucy Turnpenny. William was a signalman living at Station Cottages in Bolton Abbey. When Ernest was 5 the family moved to Station Cottage, 125 Main Street in Addingham. Ernest worked as a railway clerk, and then for Bradford Dyers Association. He was living with his wife and young daughter at 3 Hudson Yard, when he joined up in 1940.

Ernest was posted to the Signals Corps and joined the No. 6 Army Air Support Signals, formed in September 1941. A month later he embarked from Gourock, arriving two months later in Singapore, two days before the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbour. By 10 February 1942 Ernest's Section's radio sets had been destroyed by intense shelling and bombing, and his Section were sent to assist the Military Police. On 15 February Singapore was surrendered to the Japanese. Ernest and his colleagues marched to Changi, 15 miles outside Singapore where they were kept, inadequately fed and housed, for several weeks.

Ernest left Changi on 24 June 1942 by rail to Ban Pong in (now) Thailand (then Siam). He was then forced to march with others 25 miles to Kanchanaburi (the town with the so-called Bridge over the River Kwai) well West of Bangkok. Ernest is recorded as dying 6 months later. This was caused by a combination of dysentery and malaria, due to the appalling treatment of prisoners of war by the Japanese.

Ernest grave is at 2G 40 in the Kanchanaburi Cemetery, which is across the road from an excellent museum recording the brutal events of those years.

VJ DAY FILM: "The Bridge Over the River Kwai" Friday 22 August



This iconic film describing the building of the so-called Death Railway is being shown in the Memorial Hall from 7pm on Friday 22 August as part of the celebrations of Victory over Japan Day, which preceded it on Friday 15 August.

This is a particularly appropriate tribute to one Addingham man, Ernest Turnpenny of the Royal Signals, who captured on the fall of Singapore died like so many others of a combination of malnutrition, dysentery and malaria while building the railway through Thailand and Burma.

The film was made in 1957 by David Lean from the novel by Pierre Boulle. It was the highest grossing film of that year, winning 7 Academy awards including that of Best Film. In 1999 the British Film Institute (BFI) called it the 11th greatest British film of the 20th Century.


