It's been a busy year, and I would like to thank all our trustees for their commitment to maintaining the Society as an important part of village life. But we have two particular thanks to make.




Our wonderful President, Don Barrett, has decided that it's time to step down. Don has

Climate Action Addingham Annual Village Meeting

Saturday 15th November saw a great turn out for the annual review meeting. Numerous village groups and organisations met to discuss and share the climate change/biodiversity loss projects they have been involved in during the last year.



With displays, talks and key note speakers it's clear that between us there is an enormous amount of positive action. To mention just a few, St Peter's not only has projects but also reported on steps that individual members of their congregation are taking, the school children provided a fascinating display showing their research identifying all the steps the school has been taking from reducing food waste to the collection of spent batteries. For the "big picture" Kath Clarke outlined the Bradford Climate Action Plan and Alex Evans encouraged us to have climate conversations. And there is more to come, such as the Allotments & Gardens Association in conjunction with the Parish Council are developing a project to harvest water on the allotments.

There is now several years' worth of data and most importantly the next steps will include a look at the trends and progress. Watch this space.

Ian Cameron from our Heritage Group writes: Our Georgian confectioners. Part One – introduction



Just over two hundred years ago, George IV was king, and Napoleon had recently died. By now, Addingham was an established industrial textile village with four mills – High Mill, Low Mill, Townend and Fentiman's. These mills were supported by a population of 1,570, which in turn was supported by a variety of shops, goods and services.

In 1822, according to the Baines's Directory, that support included two confectioners – Michael Booker and Zaccheus Steel. Just how did these confectioners operate in Georgian times? What did they sell?

We know confectioners to the king and the nobility produced elaborate banquet displays but a recipe book that includes the creation of an ornamental cake as an elephant, and instructions on how to build an icehouse, hardly seems relevant to day-to-day life in Georgian Addingham. Fortunately, we have recipe books from provincial confectioners of the time that help us better imagine the working lives of Michael and Zaccheus. This would have centred on making and selling - sugar sweets; cakes and biscuits; pies, tarts and puddings; jellies and preserves. We shall explore these further in future articles.

As to where Michael and Zaccheus worked in the village, that is unknown. Perhaps the front of their shops looked like that

of the world's oldest running sweetshop – that at Pateley Bridge. Started in 1827 by a chemist and druggist, the inside is full of colourful delights.

While the shops of Michael and Zaccheus would also have been colourful, there are sweets that we expect to buy today, that would be conspicuous by their absence. The most obvious is that there would be no chocolate bars nor fondants, toffees, caramels, fudge, liquorice or fruit gums among others — all to come as industrialisation and new techniques develop. Branding of products too, would be for the future.

Despite this, as we decide what to buy in either of their shops, we can be confident that Michael Booker and Zaccheus Steel are masters of the art of sugar boiling, flavourings and colourings, in a way that would have seemed like alchemy to the village residents. Next time we will consider that key ingredient, sugar.






Our Latest Publication - Samuel Cunliffe Lister
