

Chris Acomb, AEG Bird Co-ordinator, writes about Barn Owl Boxes

There have been Barn Owls nesting in a hole in an old Ash tree, in Newlands Field, close to the centre of Addingham for over 10 years. We thought it would be a good idea to provide more nesting sites around the village for any offspring. Barn Owls are not territorial and often share Home Ranges with other Barn Owls. We decided it would be a good idea to put up two boxes perhaps 100metres apart to provide a separate roosting site for the male when there are young with the female in the nest box. We chose a site 300m south of the Addingham Bypass (A65) on a tree ~20m from a public footpath at a section called Cat Steps. There are also Barn Owl boxes on Addingham Moorside and one north of the village settlement between Bark Lane and

the River Wharfe. With support from Wharfedale Naturalists we bought 2 boxes from the RSPB. The nest boxes need to be at least 3m above ground so we needed experts with ladders. We enlisted friends, a retired tree surgeon and a retired fireman who did a great job of fastening the boxes securely in the trees. The boxes have easy access to open fields with one facing east and the other south east away from the prevailing wind. Over the years Barns Owls have been seen quartering fields not far away but these could be the original owls from the old Ash tree. Then about 3 years ago the remains of a dead Barn Owl were seen under one of the new boxes. No Barn Owls have been seen at these nest boxes since then and there doesn't appear to be any pellets under the boxes. The question is whether we should leave the boxes for a bit longer or move them to another location?

The Clarkes of Low Mill

About 1870 Martin Clarke of County Leitrim married Bridget Clinton, both of County Leitrim in Ireland. With only two children, Michael and Anne, they moved to Low Mill, in (then) Long Addingham, Martin working variously as farm labourer and stone dresser. As a devout Catholic family, the children walked in all weathers to the Catholic School in Ilkley, though Michael began work in Low Mill at the age of 9. He took his weaving skills to Spain, married a Spaniard and in 1904 emigrated to America. Sadly, he lost his life in the San Francisco earthquake of 1906.

Anne also emigrated to America at 18, after she too had become an expert weaver.

Catherine, the next Clarke daughter, was born in 1876, dying in New York in 1966 aged 90. She suffered an eye injury from a thrown stone when young. She never married and was a retiring person, living with her sisters in America. Ellen was the third daughter, born in 1880 and dying in New York in 1967 aged 87.

However, it was the fourth daughter, Sarah Margaret, born in 1883, who became Mrs Sarah Foley after marrying a New York attorney. Sarah had been a nurse, apparently nursing at Menston and Scalebor Park. The Foleys had no children. A further sister, Agnes, was born in Addingham in 1886, and died in New York in 1968 a year after Ellen. She married a very wealthy man, Fred Edsall. But they also had no children, and Agnes was a widow from the 1930s.

The last child of Martin and Bridget Clarke was James Clarke, known as Jimmy, born in 1888. He emigrated in 1915 on the Carpathia, full of refugees and careful to dodge German submarines. (The Lusitania had been sunk by a German torpedo on 7 May that year off Cork in Southern Ireland.) His father had already emigrated with Catherine, as Bridget had died in 1913 of pneumonia, having moved to Ilkley to be closer to the Catholic Church. James died on October 30th 1973 in his New York apartment aged 85.

Sarah Foley and James Clarke are the well-known benefactors of both Ilkley and Addingham, as it would appear that of the 8 siblings, only one, Anne, had children.

James was the sibling who started the Clarke's business in New York, renovating and then renting first one apartment block and then another, until eventually the family owned 6 multi-family dwellings on East 98th Street. James did the plumbing and repair work required, while his sisters did cleaning, painting and Ellen (Nellie) in particular was the one who rented out the apartments and kept the books.

Later the City Council condemned the whole area but paid enough compensation to allow the Clarkes to invest in the stock market and retire.

Finally, as much as £1,250,000 was left to Ilkley and Addingham in what is now referred to as the Clarke Foley bequest: in Ilkley for the building which carries their names, and to Addingham for the annual bequest for those aged over 65 who have lived in the village for over 2 years. These decisions were guided by Bishop Wheeler of Leeds who remembers James Clarke as this "huge, broad-shouldered man with white hair wearing a ten-gallon hat", but still a devout Catholic. Sarah, known as Sally, had predeceased James by a year, dying in 1972.

Do make an opportunity to visit The Hub during November. The display will feature some myth busting facts.


Here are the MYTHS
